We take time to honor the extraordinary contributions of Hispanic women who have shaped history and continue to inspire change. Here are three remarkable women whose legacies have left an indelible mark on our society:

DOLORES HUERTA

Dolores Huerta, co-founder of the United Farm Workers (UFW), has dedicated her life to advocating for labor rights and social justice. Her relentless fight for better working conditions, fair wages, and dignity for farmworkers transformed labor movements across the U.S. Huerta coined the phrase "Sí, se puede" ("Yes, we can"), a rallying cry that continues to resonate in movements for equality and justice today. Beyond labor advocacy, Huerta has been a champion for gender equality and civil rights, and her work continues to empower marginalized communities.

SILVIA RIVERA



A pioneer in the LGBTQ+ rights movement, Sylvia Rivera was instrumental in the fight for transgender rights during the early years of the LGBTQ+ liberation movement. A fearless advocate, Rivera cofounded the Gay Liberation Front and Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries (STAR), pushing for greater inclusivity and representation within the movement. Her advocacy brought attention to the struggles faced by transgender people, especially those who were homeless and marginalized. Rivera's legacy continues to inspire the ongoing fight for equality within the LGBTQ+ community.

JULIA de BURGOS

Julia de Burgos was a renowned Puerto Rican poet whose writings became a voice for social justice, women's rights, and Puerto Rican independence. Her powerful poetry often addressed issues of colonialism, identity, and the struggles of the oppressed. Despite facing personal hardship, de Burgos used her platform to call for equality and to uplift the marginalized. Today, her work remains a cornerstone in Latin American and feminist literature, reminding us of the power of words to inspire change.



FIRST WOMAN: A LASTING RECORD OF WOMEN'S HISTORY IN POLITICS

It wasn't that long ago. In 2016, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton became the first woman to be nominated by a major political party (Democratic) for the presidency of the United States.

Today, when Vice-President Kamala Harris says, "I am here because I stand on the shoulders," she is referring to Secretary Clinton and the other remarkable women who have campaigned for president in the past. These include publisher Victoria Woodhull in 1872 for the Women's Rights Party, lawyer Bella Lockwood in 1884 and 1888 for the National Equal Rights Party, Senator Margaret Chase Smith in 1964 for the Republican Party, and Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm in 1972 for the Democratic Party.


