





## In Memory of Judy Yung: A Friend and Women's History Pioneer

Judy Yung was a very special friend and colleague. She served on the NWHA National Advisory Committee from the very beginning of the National Women's History Project/Alliance. She was

a tremendous influence on our work by providing an every expansion understanding of women's history.

As a librarian working in the Chinatown public library branch during the early 1970s, Judy Yung discovered a major hole in the collections and in scholarship in general. There were no scholars on the experience of Chinese American women, in ordinary life.

To address this absence, she quit her job to go back to school to get her doctorate in ethnic studies at UC Berkeley. She traveled for two year collecting oral histories from Chinese American women which led to her pioneering work in establishing Asian American Studies Studies at UC Santa Cruz.

We are saddened by her death, but are grateful for her friendship and for her incredible impact in reclaiming the lives of Chinese American women, and for presenting a more complete picture and understanding of the history of Asian American women.





U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) announced that The Smithsonian Women's History Museum Act which they co-sponsored passed the Senate as part of the year-end omnibus funding package. This bipartisan legislation will establish a Smithsonian museum in Washington, D.C., honoring American women.


In December 2014, Congress created a Congressional Commission to study the potential for an American museum of women's history in Washington, D.C. This bipartisan commission unanimously recommended the creation of a new Smithsonian museum dedicated to women's history. Incorporating their recommendations, this bill will establish a national museum to collect, study, and create programs on a wide spectrum of American women's experiences, contributions, and history.







## Important News and Links

### Celebrate Women's History Month!

Did you know that Women's History Month was originally [Women's History Week](#), and that it got its start in Sonoma County, California?

As recently as the 1970s, women's history was virtually an unknown topic in the K-12 curriculum, or in general public consciousness. To address this situation, the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women initiated a "Women's History Week" celebration for 1978, with a focus on March 8th, International Women's Day. (That's today!)

The local Women's History Week activities were met with an enthusiastic response, and dozens of schools planned special programs for the week, and over 100 community women participated by giving special presentations in classrooms throughout the county. The finale for the week was a celebratory parade and program held in the center of downtown Santa Rosa, California.



And did you know that the [National Women's History Alliance](#) has been there since the very beginning?

When we started out 40 years ago, only 3% of the content of US textbooks was devoted to women. There have been big strides in improving representation, but there is still a long way to go for parity. As we learned in the recent [Where are the Women Summit](#), women still only make up 24% of the historical figures covered.

Spanning the 70+ years from the first organizing meeting in 1848 in Seneca Falls, NY, to the dramatic last minute change of heart vote of one young representative in the Tennessee Legislature, these stories bring the real women and men who fought for and against enfranchisement for women.



The first episode, "[More Than a Sentence](#)," features the story of Susan B. Anthony. In 1872, Anthony was tried and convicted for voting in a federal election. More Than a Sentence moves from her arrest in her Rochester home to her famous statement in court prior to sentencing, drawing upon transcriptions of Anthony's own words to recreate the scene.







Like many, we have been thinking about the anniversary of the pandemic, and how a year ago we didn't know how things were going to go, or how bad they would get.



Women's History comes alive with the help of [talented performers and authors](#) in cities across the country and in online presentations.




One special artist who has long been a supporter of the NWHA and our mission is songwriter, performer and educator [Linda Allen](#).

# Gerda Lerner: My Inspiration

## (April 30, 1920 – January 2, 2013)

In 1979, I was selected to attend the 19-day Women's History Institute for Women Leaders, held at Sara Lawrence College, and chaired by Gerda Lerner. The 39 participants included the Presidents of many women's organizations including the Girls Scouts of America, NOW, and Women's Action Alliance, as well as noted scholars and women who had served with Bella Abzug in organizing the National Women's Conference held in Houston in 1977.




My invitation was issued because I had written a plea to the organizing committee to consider introducing the idea of a National Women's History Week. Along with my plea, I had sent copies of the materials we had produced for the celebrations of [Women's History Week in Sonoma County](#) in 1978 and 1979.




To determine a time to make my pitch to the conference participants, I needed to meet with Gerda. As I write this, I remember my quivering knees and pounding heart. At that moment in time, I could not have imagined our future relationship. It was inconceivable to me that she would become my personal champion as well the essential champion for the establishment of what has become National Women's History Month and the National Women's History Alliance.





After 13 years of sweat, tears and fundraising, the virtual dedication of the **Turning Point Suffragist Memorial** was held earlier this month, on May 16.


More than a century after millions of women succeeded in their efforts to see the 19th

## Celebrating the Woman Suffrage Centennial: ?What Happened and What Have We Learned?









## Even More Ways to Celebrate the Centennial!

Lynn Sherr and Ellen Goodman launched their fantastic and informative new podcast **She Votes!**

**She Votes!** is an 8-part audio documentary that digs into the complex history of the women's suffrage movement with all its glory and shortcomings. From the first demands to speak on public matters by antislavery activists in 1837, through the 1848 Seneca Falls Convention for women's rights, to the drama of the final passage in 1920 and beyond.



They're telling the story of a movement that carries astonishing relevance and importance today. They explore issues of gender and race, generational conflicts, power and politics, and connect their own ceiling-crashing careers to the struggles of our foremothers.

**INTO LIGHT** brings to life Inez Milholland, one of the leaders of the suffrage movement in 1916. In the clutches of terminal illness, she steels herself for the final speech of her tour -- rallying the nation to give women the right to vote. Though President Wilson and most of the voting men see the cause as a threat, still she persists. As her galvanizing speech reaches a fever pitch, she suddenly collapses. The doctor insists she rush to the hospital, but nothing will stop her - or the tide of equality.






## Women's Suffrage Centennial Catalog

## September 15 to October 15 is National Hispanic American Heritage Month



Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, Central America, and South America.


Beginning in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson, the celebration was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15.

September 15 of every year was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. All declared independence in 1821. In addition, Mexico, Chile and Belize celebrate their independence days on September 16, September 18, and September 21, respectively.

Ever since the founding of the National Women's History Alliance, we have celebrated and honored Hispanic American women their contributions to American culture and history.





## November is Indigenous People's Month



November has been designated as Native American Heritage Month, and the time to celebrate the culture, accomplishments, and contributions of people who were the first inhabitants of the United States, and on whose land we live today.

This November, and every month, we celebrate the culture and heritage of these remarkable Americans who deeply enrich the quality and character of our Nation.

**Jaune Quick-to-See Smith** (2008 NWHA Honoree) is a contemporary artist who helped give voice and vision to the American Civil Rights Movement. She brings the focus and uniqueness of her own cultural history and experience to her art and to her vision.

Born in 1940 at the St. Ignatius Indian Mission on the Flathead Reserve in Montana, the influence of her father's drawings can be seen in her colorful paintings that include the same miniature animals which leap and swirl among Native American geometric motifs.

She calls herself a 'cultural art worker,' which is apparent in her work. Her paintings, drawings, and prints look at things Native and national through bifocals of the old and the new, the sacred and the profane, the divine and the witty.

Smith uses humor and satire to examine myths, stereotypes, and the paradox of American Indian life in contrast to the consumerism of American society. She has completed several collaborative public art works such as the floor design in the Great Hall of the Denver Airport. Exhibited worldwide, she is also a curator of Native American exhibitions, as well as an art educator, art advocate, and political activist.

## The WVCI Website is Now Located on the NWHA Website



The Women's Vote Centennial Initiative (WVCI) served as the national clearinghouse for information and organizations commemorating the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of women winning the constitutional right to vote. This organization was successful in drawing greater national, state and local

attention to women's long struggle for the vote and the relevance of that effort to issues of today. After an impactful six-year run the 2020 (WVCI) closed on September 30, 2021.

The WVCI website and archives will be available for viewing at the Schlesinger Library at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University.

## Petition for Accessible, Secure Currency with New Portraits

We the undersigned want to have our new currency designs including new portraits as announced in 2016, meaningful access to our currency for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and high quality, counterfeit resistant currency by 12/31/24. The Treasury's 20+ year delay in providing accessibility for the Blind is unacceptable. We must redesign US currency now. The new currency should include the portraits of Tubman and other suffragists, including at least 10 and not just the 5 previously selected, as well as Frederick Douglass, and the complete removal of Andrew Jackson. We need this done in this administration. We cannot wait until 2026 and beyond for updated banknotes. We have the capability, we must awaken the will.





**Joy Harjo** is a multidisciplinary artist and a member of the Muscogee Creek Nation in Oklahoma. Her passion for the arts began early, and by the age of sixteen, she attended the Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA) in Santa Fe, New Mexico, where she discovered painting as one means of expression on her way to becoming a professional poet, playwright, author, and musician.

Joy Harjo's work draws on Native indigenous histories and storytelling, as well as feminist, environmental, social justice, and poetic themes. The complexity, relevance, and beauty of Harjo's poetry have made her both a household name and a critically acclaimed poet.

She is the first Native American U.S. Poet Laureate, and only the second Poet Laureate Consultant in Poetry to serve three terms. For her signature project as the 2019-2021 U.S. Poet Laureate, Harjo gathered the works of contemporary Native American poets into a fully digital map titled [Living Nations, Living](#)




