



Vational Women's History Project's Story.

Before 1980 few women's history resources existed in the elementary and secondary classrooms (and in many cases few meant none). Establishing a Women's History Week for the week of March 8th (International Women's Day) was an effective way to encourage teachers to discuss women and to foster a multicultural perspective. The work was officially done by the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women.

The idea of a Women's History Week and the leadership had come from five friends who became the cofounders of the National Women's History Project (NWHP).

Because of the success of our first two Women's History Weeks, Molly Murphy MacGregor took the idea to a Women's History Institute in the summer of 1979, chaired by women's history pioneer, Gerda Lerner. The Institute participants were leaders from a wide-range of national women's organizations, who passed the resolution to create a National Women's History Week. Using an enthusiastic lobbying effort, they activated their extensive networks and along with many history organizations encouraged local, state, and national elected officials to support a National Women's History Week.

In 1980 President Carter issued a Presidential Message calling on the American people to pause and remember the extraordinary accomplishments of American women during the week of March 2-8, 1980. That same year, we founded the National Women's History Project and received a Women's Education Equity Act Grant. The funding was to design a teacher training resource that would help teachers incorporate women's history into all grades and subjects.

At the same time we were beginning to create a mailing list from the requests we received from people who had read that we had developed some women's history materials... Our focus was expanding the K-12 curriculum to include women.

We identified all the books related to women's history and selected the best for inclusion in our catalog. Over time, what had begun as a single-page flyer became a yearly 32- page catalog with a distribution of 100,000 copies. As our distribution network grew, we were contacted by Federal Employed Women (FEW) who encouraged us to also produce resources for Women's Equality Day, August 26th celebrations on the anniversary of women in the U.S. winning the vote. Since that time FEW have become some of our strongest supporters.

When we began, the internet as we know it did not exist... The NWHP served as the Google.com and Facebook of the multicultural women's history movement in those early years.

Today, women's history organizations exist from school campuses to state and national institutions. Also, there are an extraordinary number of on-line resources with both primary sources and lesson plans. Check them out at Women's History links in Resources on our website www.nwhp.org. In 1984, we launched the Women's History Network to link educators, librarians, workplace organizes and individuals interested in women's history. Mary Ruthsdotter edited the quarterly Network News, which was published until 2000. As a nonprofit education organization, we were very fortunate to have most of our work sustained by catalog sales. In time, we grew to a team of 14 paid and volunteer staff. Each person contributed to the amazing work we were accomplishing.

In 1987 we successfully led the lobbying effort to have Congress officially expand National Women's History Week to National Women's History Month in March.

We were able to produce some cutting-edge media like Women in American Life 1-5, a five-part series on the multicultural history of women in United States, and Adelante Mujeres, produced in English and Spanish, the only media overview of the history of Mexican

Additionally, we expanded our outreach with teacher training sessions throughout the country. And each summer we conducted a 4-day training in California, which

we called A Woman's Place is...in the Curriculum. In 1995, we led the national campaign to include celebration of the 75th anniversary of women winning the vote in schools, communities, workplaces, as well as in our nation's capitol.

And, again in 1998, we launched a national campaign to honor and recognize the 150th anniversary of the first women's right convention in Seneca Falls in 1848.



With the advent of Amazon.com and cutbacks in funding for school budgets, our sales began to decline.

As the year 2000 approached, we were faced with the urgent need to have our equipment be Y2 compliant. We needed to purchase a new mail-order system and all new computers. This process was fraught with difficulties we could not have anticipated.

35 Years of Writing Women Back into History

We celebrated our 20th anniversary in the grandest of fashions. The President's Commission on American History honored us with an amazing 20th anniversary celebration in Statuary Hall in our nation's Capitol Building. It was an extraordinary event in every way --- the place, the people who spoke, and the people who came from across the country to attend. Many had been with us from our early beginnings.

Alas, returning to California after that celebration, we discovered that our new mail-order system had been erroneously recording double amounts for our sales and new inventory had been ordered accordingly. By the time the problem was discovered, we owed the bank and our vendors over \$500,000.

Resolved to pay this debt, we were faced with very difficult decisions,

including downsizing our staff and our office. Even making these painful and dramatic changes would not have been enough without the support and patience of our landlord, bank, and our vendors. Paying off that kind of debt took many years and the extraordinary support and generosity of countless people to whom we will always be grateful.

The story of our recovery is as remarkable as our evolution from a grassroots organization to a national institution. During this time, we were able to partner with other women's organizations who have their own triumphant survival stories. (See the Partners¹ list on Page 3.) The years since have been filled with challenges, but also with extraordinary moments, and wonderful celebrations of moving history forward.



Our 35th anniversary is a tribute to the collective effort of tens of thousands of people.



2015 HONOREES

(In Chronological Order)

Delilah L. Beasley (1871-1934)

Journalist and Historian

Delilah Beasley was the first African American woman published regularly in a major newspaper (the Oakland Tribune) and wrote a groundbreaking book on the history of African Americans in California.

Eleanor Flexner (1908-1995)

Women's History Pioneer and Scholar Eleanor Flexner's groundbreaking book, Century of Struggle, was the first suffrage history to highlight the contributions of African American and working class women. Her book remains a seminal work in the field of Women's Studies.

Gladys Tantaquidgeon (1988-2005)

Mohegan Medicine Woman, Tribal Elder, and Anthropologist

Gladys Tantaquidgeon wrote several books on Native American traditional medicine and served as curator for the Tantaquidgeon Indian Museum for over fifty years.

Polly Welts Kaufman (1929-Present)

Historian and Women's Historic Trails Pioneer Polly Welts Kaufman is a professor of women's history and served as project director for women's historic trails in Boston; Portland, ME; and Oslo, Norway.

Lynn Sherr (1942-Present)

Broadcast Journalist and Author Lynn Sherr has covered politics, space, and social change for over 30 years and has written many books on women's history including her recent biography of Sally Ride.

Judy Yung (1946-Present)

Oral Historian, Author, and Professor Judy Yung is a leading scholar in Asian American history, especially focused on uncovering the untold history of Chinese American women.

Darlene Clark Hine (1947-Present)

Educator and Pioneer in African American Women's History

Darlene Clark Hine helped found the field of Black Women's History and won a 2013 National Humanities Medal for "enriching our understanding of the African American experience."

Holly Near (1949-Present)

Singer, Songwriter, and Activist
Holly Near was among the first women to create
an independent record company and has dedicated
her music career to the issues of peace, justice, and
feminism.

Vicki L. Ruiz (1955-Present)

Educator and Pioneer in Latina History Vicki Ruiz is a leading scholar of 20th century U.S. History specializing in Chicana/Chicano studies, Latina history, oral narratives, gender studies, and labor history.






Weaving the Stories of Women's Lives

2015 Theme

Weaving the Stories of Women's Lives



Weaving the Stories of Women's Lives, the 2015 National Women's History Month theme, presents the opportunity to integrate the diverse and compelling stories of women's lives into a colorful tapestry highlighting the intricacies and interconnection of these stories.

The 2015 (NWHM) Honorees were chosen for their pioneering leadership and accomplishments in researching and sharing the details of women's lives. Their achievements - individually and collectively - have been essential in weaving the amazing and courageous stories of women's lives into the colorful fabric of our nation's history.

Narratives of the lives of individual women are critically important because they offer exceptionally strong role models who share a more expansive vision of what a woman can do. The stories of women's lives, and the choices they made, encourage girls and young women to think in larger and bolder terms about their own futures, and give boys and men a fuller understanding of the female

experience. Knowing women's achievements challenges stereotypes and social assumptions about who women are and how they can transcend traditions and prejudices to embrace whatever goals they choose to set.

Remembering and recounting tales of our ancestors' talents, sacrifices, and commitments will inspire each new generation. Some may find such inspiration from a mother or grandmother, but others can seek such role models in books that take them far beyond their own ethnic or class boundaries. We are proud that, after decades of dedicated research and technological advances, the stories of American women from all cultures are accessible and visible as never before.

2015 is also the 35th anniversary of the Women's History Movement and the National Women's History Project. We have chosen this year to honor a selection of the numerous scholars and activists who helped shape the Women's History Movement, and also provided the research and energy which created and continues to sustain the National Women's History Project.

Delilah L. Beasley

(1867-1934) Historian and Newspaper Columnist

At her memorial service to honor her life, the following pledge was made – Every life casts it shadow, my life plus others make a power to move the world. I, therefore pledge my life to the living work of brotherhood and material understanding between the race.

Delilah L. Beasley was the first African American woman to be regularly published in a major metropolitan newspaper and the first author to present the history of African Americans in early California.

Growing up in Ohio, Beasley started writing social columns for black and white newspapers while still a teenager. After her parents' deaths, she sought a career path that would better support her younger siblings, working as a hairdresser, massage therapist, nurse, and maid for many years. In 1910, she moved to Oakland California where she



immersed herself in the local black community and again started writing articles in local newspapers.

In 1915, Beasley started writing a weekly column in the *Oakland Tribune*. Her articles protested the stereotypes contained in the movie *The Birth of a Nation*. Through a column called "Activities among Negroes," she campaigned for African-American dignity and rights. Highlighting activities of local churches, women's clubs, literary societies, along with national politics, and achievements of black

men and women, her column aimed to give all readers a positive picture of the black community and demonstrate the capabilities of African Americans.

Deeply interested in the history of black Californians, Beasley trained herself in archival research and oral histories. In 1919, she self-published *The Negro* Trail-Blazers of California, a groundbreaking book chronicling the lives of hundreds of black Californians from the pioneer period through the early 20th century. Her book included an unprecedented amount of Black women's history, focusing on the strong roles women played in their communities and featuring countless biographies of women leaders.

In the thirties, Beasley was the driving force behind the passage California's first anti-lynching bill. She continued her column and was active in the community until her death in 1934.

California African-American Women Trail-Blazers

Mary Ellen Pleasant (1812-1904) escaped slavery and brought the Underground Railroad to California. Brought numerous civil rights cases to the courts in the 1860s and 70s including successfully overturning streetcar segregation in San Francisco (1866).

Biddy Mason (1818-1891) escaped slavery and became a nurse and midwife and had much success as a Los Angeles real estate entrepreneur and philanthropist.

Lydia Flood Jackson (1862-1963) first Black student to attend integrated public school in Oakland, went on to become a women's rights activist, suffragist, and successful business woman.

Dr. Ruth J Temple (1892-1984) first licensed African American woman physician in California.

Kate Bradley-Stovall (1884-1914) organized the Southern California Alumni Association (1909) and served as president for four years

Mohegan Medicine Woman, Anthropologist, and **Tribal Elder**

"In my early years, I wasn't aware that time was going so rapidly ... later I realized many of our old people were dying and their knowledge went with them. Something had to be done to preserve a record of their way of life. My goal has always been that this information ...be passed on to future generations."

Gladys Tantaquidgeon's life spanned the entire 20th century. She grew up in the Mohegan community (Uncasville, Connecticut) learning traditional practices, beliefs, and herbalism. She only completed grade school, but at age 20 she took the opportunity to study anthropology at the University of Pennsylvania. She completed extensive field research on east coast Indian tribal



cultures and herbal medicines and published several books based on her research. In 1931, she cofounded Tantaquidgeon Museum with her brother and father; it remains the oldest American Indian-owned museum in the U.S.

In 1934, Tantaquidgeon started work with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and for the next 10 years she provided social services and worked as a native arts specialist in Native American communities in

the north central U.S. She became an expert in preserving and reviving traditional practices that had been forbidden or lost in the 19th century. During the 1940s she also worked as a librarian in a Connecticut women's prison, where she used skills gained from her previous work helping struggling Native women.

In 1947, Tantaquidgeon began working as the full time curator for her family's museum. For the next 50 years she introduced visitors to her tribe's history and traditions through a collection of artifacts and crafts. The museum was created under the assumption that "you can't hate someone you know a lot about." In her later years, she served on the Mohegan Tribal Council and continued her work as a medicine woman. Throughout her life Tantaquidgeon collected tribal records and documents that in 1994 proved to be critical to the success of the Mohegan Tribe's decadeslong campaign to gain federal recognition.

Notable Mohegan Women

Fidelia Hoscott Fielding

(1827-1908), last native speaker of the Mohegan-Pequot language, kept four adult diaries in the language that proved critical to reconstructing the language and its reintroduction to new generations.

Emma Fielding Baker

(1828-1916), revivalist of the Green Corn Ceremony and tribal chairperson.

Stephanie Fielding, published a Modern Mohegan Dictionary (2006) and created the online Mohegan Language Project, a major contributor to revitalize the Mohegan language.

Melissa Tantaquidgeon Zobel

Mohegan medicine woman, tribal historian, author, and great niece of Gladys Tantaquidgeon, wrote four books on Mohegan culture including Medicine Trail: The Life and Lessons of Gladys Tantaquidgeon (2000).

Weaving the Stories

Eleanor Flexner

1908 - 1995)

Women's History Pioneer and Scholar

"In the end all women and all men can only benefit from the more truthful and balanced image of women which will emerge from history where they are shown to have been actively involved in shaping their own destiny and that of the country."

1975 Preface to Century of Struggle

Eleanor Flexner's groundbreaking 1959 book Century of Struggle: The Women's Right Movement in the United States marked her as a pioneer in the field of women's studies. In this landmark publication Flexner relates women's physically courageous and politically ingenious work for the vote to other 19th- and early 20thcentury social, labor, and reform movements. Most importantly, she includes the importance of the



campaigns for equal education, the abolition of slavery, and the advocacy of temperance laws.

In the 1940s, Flexner began researching the 19th-century labor struggles of American women but found that few historians had touched the subject. She was already planning to write a history of the American woman suffrage movement and was convinced that any treatment must deal with

the experiences of working class women and politically active women of color. Her book was so comprehensive on these unexplored subjects that Harvard University Press accepted it for publication despite her lack of academic credentials.

In the seventies Flexner expanded Century of Struggle to address the growing audience interested in women's history and wrote her last book, a biography of Mary Wollstonecraft. She was awarded an honorary doctorate of humane letters from Swarthmore College in 1974. An expanded edition of Century of Struggle was published in 1975 and the paperback expanded yet again in 1999.

Her analysis will long be recognized as a source of inspiration for "second wave" feminists who went on to lay the groundwork for subsequent generations of women's history scholars.

Women Who Influenced Flexner's Research

Inez Haynes Irwin (1873-1970), feminist, author, journalist, and suffragist.

Wrote Angels and Amazons: A Hundred Years of American Women (1938), this extensive suffrage history failed to recognize the contributions of African Americans and working class women.

Miriam Young Holden (1893-

1977), co-authored The American Women in Colonial and Revolutionary Times 1565-1800 (1962). Granted Flexner full access to her extensive private collections of women's history books and documents.

Dorothy Burnett Porter

(1905-1995), African American librarian and curator. Built the Moorland-Spingarn Research Center at Howard University into world-class collection.

Jean Blackwell Hutson

(1914-1998), African American librarian and archivist. Served as curator and chief of the Schomburg Collection for Research in Black Culture at a Harlem branch of the NY Public Library (1948-80).

Early Park Founders and Advocates

"...As women honed their skills on the early struggles to protect wild and historic places, they also changed their perspective from that of amateur conservationists to citizen preservationists, they stepped out of their private roles into the politics of public advocacy.

The collective backing by thousands of women in the General Federation of Women's Clubs brought major support to the bill establishing the National Park Service itself in 1916. The women-run Garden Club of America monitored national parks and spoke out against threats to the integrity of the parks.

In historic preservation, local and national women's groups used the commemoration of historic sites both to instill patriotic values in the coming generation and to promote healing of the losses from the nation's war."

Polly Welts Kaufman

(1929 – Present) Writer, Teacher, Activist

"By connecting with the lives of your figurative sisters, mothers, grandmothers, and great grandmothers in all the diversity of the backgrounds they represent, you gain strength from the challenges and successes of the women who came before you. "If she could do that — if she could overcome that — if she could create that — so can !!"

Polly Welts Kaufman is a writer, teacher and above all an activist for equality. Her path to writing women's lives began with the sound of a door closing, heavy as it was with gendered prejudice. Graduating from Brown University in 1951 with a degree in American Studies, she planned to teach high school in Providence, Rhode Island only to be asked, "Are you



married or going to be married?" Answering "yes," she was told to look elsewhere for employment.

Filled with reformist zeal, Kaufman nevertheless became a high school teacher in the Pacific Northwest. When she moved to Boston she became an activist in the Civil Rights Movement during the embattled period of school desegregation. She ran a program to ensure that the 100+ public schools would for the first time have book

by African American authors as well as books on African American culture and history.

Earning a Ph.D. at Boston University, she taught women's history for over twenty years. Kaufman is the author of a long list of books and articles on women's history including *National Parks and the Woman's Voice: A History; Boston Women and City School Politics*, 1872-1905; and *Women Teachers on the Frontier.*

As a project director and principal researcher, she has been involved in establishing many women's history trails including *The Boston Women's Heritage Trail* and *The Portland Women's History Trail*. Kaufman received two Fulbright Scholarships to Norway, where she helped establish *The Walking Trail of Statues to Women* in Oslo. Her work celebrates the telling of women's lives as a global conversation.

of Women's Lives

Female Journalists

Female journalists who have defied the restrictions of custom, law, social criticism, death threats and war to bear witnesses to history.

Mary Ann Shadd Cary (1823-1893), Anti-slavery journalist and first African American female publisher.

Margaret Fuller (1810-1850), First New York Tribune female foreign correspondent.

Ida Tarbell (1857-1944), Leading muckraking journalist of the Progressive Era.

Ida B. Wells (1862-1931), African American journalist, prominent leader in the anti-lynching crusade and woman suffrage movement

Jovita Idar (1885-1946), Prominent progressive journalist for Spanish-language newspapers in south Texas.

Ethel L. Payne (1911-1991), the first female African-American network TV commentator who combined advocacy with journalism.

Helen Thomas (1920-2013), Trailblazing White House journalist, covered 10 presidents over nearly half a century.

Connie Chung (1946-present), First Asian American and second woman to be a nightly anchor for a major news channel.

Lynn Sherr

(1942 - Present) **Broadcast Journalist and Author**

"The modern women's rights movement has brought about the greatest social change in our lifetime. It woke me up, gave me purpose, focused my energy.

. . I joined a growing number of twentieth-century feminists determined to set the record straight and prove definitively that the smart, bold women who had blazed the trail deserve our unmitigated thanks." Lynn Sherr

Lynn Sherr, an American broadcast journalist and author, began her career at Conde Nast, when she won the *Mademoiselle* Magazine Guest Editor Competition in college. She soon moved on to the Associated Press, then WCBS-TV, PBS, and ultimately ABC, where she covered politics, space and



social change for more than 30 years. As a correspondent for the ABC newsmagazine 20/20, she received many honors, including the George Foster Peabody Award in 1994 for "The Hunger Inside," about anorexia.

For over a decade Sherr, along with Jurate Kazickas, created *The Women's Appointment Calendar*, a day-by-day recollection of women's historic events. The calendars are fun-filled, primary

source documents of women's history before and during the second wave of the 20th century women's movement.

Sherr is an unabashed feminist who has twice been the recipient of the Planned Parenthood's Margaret Sanger Award, honoring journalists for "exceptional coverage of reproductive rights and healthcare issues." Sherr has rejected calls for a "new feminism," remarking, "What's wrong with the old feminism?"

In Susan B. Anthony Slept Here (1976), Sherr recognized the importance of reclaiming and visiting women's historic landmarks. Her latest best-selling book, Sally Ride: America's First Woman in Space (2014), is the only adult biography of that pathbreaking woman. Sherr's career on and off TV is courageously chronicled in Outside the Box: A Memoir (2006).

Judy Yung

(1946 - Present) Librarian and Pioneer in **Asian-American History**

"The personal is political for me... Inspired by the Asian American and women's liberation movements in the 1970s, I began researching, interviewing, and writing about Chinese American women in an effort to reclaim my history as a Chinese American woman, refute mainstream stereotypes of the China Doll and Dragon Lady, and set the historical record straight. And I haven't stopped since."

Judy Yung is best known for her groundbreaking work in documenting the immigration history of Angel Island and the life stories of Chinese American women. As a second-generation Chinese American born and raised in San Francisco Chinatown, Yung embarked on a lifelong mission to reclaim the history of Chinese Americans and to



educate Americans about the lives, struggles, and contributions to this country.

Her first book, Island (1980), involved translating Chinese poems that were found on the walls of the Angel Island Immigration Station and conducting oral history interviews with former Chinese

In 1981, with a grant from the federal Women's Educational Act Program, Yung researched and designed a pictorial exhibit on the history of Chinese American women that traveled throughout the country. In 1986, she wrote the first book on the same subject—Chinese Women of America: A Pictorial History.

Eager to delve deeper into Chinese American women's history, Yung wrote Unbound Feet: A Social History of Chinese Women in San Francisco (1995), and Unbound Voices: A Documentary History of Chinese Women in San Francisco (1999). Based on primary sources (Chinese newspapers, immigration records, oral history interviews, and personal memoirs and writings), the books show how race, class, and gender discrimination shaped the lives of two generations of Chinese American women during a time of great social ferment in China as well as in the United States.

As a professor of American Studies at UC Santa Cruz, Yung taught courses in ethnic studies, Asian American studies, and women's history, and helped develop an Asian American Studies Program.

Women featured in **Chinese Women of America: A Pictorial** History

Polly Bemis (1853-1933), was sold by impoverished parents in China and brought to the US as a slave and prostitute. After winning her freedom she became a well-respected homesteader and pioneer of Idaho.

Mary Tape (1857-1934), was an accomplished artist and outspoken woman who dared to sue San Francisco's Board of Education for barring her children from attending the public

Tye Leung Schulze (1887-1972), was the first Chinese American woman to work for the civil service as well as the first to vote in an election (San Francisco, 1912).

Kathryn Cheung (1904-2003), was the first Asian American woman to earn a pilot's license and to join Amelia Earhart's exclusive "99

Chien-Shiung Wu (1912-1997), "First Lady of Physics," worked with two Chinese Nobel Prize winners to disprove the conservation of parity principle.

Weaving the Stories

Darlene Clark Hine

(1947 – Present) **African American Women's History Pioneer**

"Receiving the 2013 National Humanities Medal... was both a blessing and a profound moment in the history of Black Women's History because it represented acknowledgement and appreciation of the work that I and my generation of scholars did to include the contributions that black women have made to our nation's progress and to the global struggle against social injustice, and economic and gender inequality."

As an historian Darlene Clark Hine sought not only to explore African American history, but to expand the discipline of history itself by focusing on black women "who remained at the very bottom of the ladder in the United States."

A leading expert on the subject of race, class, and gender in American society, Hine is credited with



helping to establish a doctoral field in Comparative Black History at Michigan State University. Among her notable contributions to the field are A Shining Thread of Hope: The History of Black Women in America (1999), and Hine Sight: Black Women and the Re-Construction of American History (1997).

While attending Chicago's Roosevelt University in the sixties, Hine says it was "hearing black activists refer so often to history, seeing the black culture celebrated by artists, and reading new works by black writers"that inspired her with the

hope that someday she could change the very definition of "history."

"Historians can write a history of anything or anyone," Hine is quoted as saying, "but apparently few considered black women worth the telling." Hine herself had to be persuaded to explore the lives of African American women in Indiana, but soon became convinced that US history was leaving out far too much that was important to nurture a comprehensive understanding of American society. Thus her preliminary research on women's roles in churches, and other settings led to brief monograph, When the Truth Is Told: Black Women's Community and Culture in Indiana, 1875-1950 (1980).

"If I can...impress upon the historical profession" she once insisted, "how important it is to talk to and illuminate the lives of people who did not leave written records, but who also influenced generations of women all over the globe, then I will feel that my career is worthwhile."

The National **Humanities Medal**

Inaugurated in 1997, the National Humanities Medal honors individuals or groups whose work has deepened the nation's understanding of the humanities and broadened our citizens' engagement with history, literature, languages, philosophy, and other humanities subjects.

The following recipients have expanded the field of American history to demonstrate the essential role of women.

1999 - Jacquelyn Dowd Hall documented the role of women in the campaign to end lynching.

2003 - Elizabeth Fox-Genovese's researched and wrote on women and society in the Antebellum South.

2009 - Annette Gordon-Reed challenged unrecognized chapters in American history by researching Thomas Jefferson's relationship with Sally Hemming.

2013 - Anne Firor Scott pioneered the study of the history of women of the South.

2013 - Darlene Clark Hine expanded the discipline of history itself by focusing on black women.

Women's Music

In the 1970s women began to establish their own record companies to escape the restrictions and sexism of the mainstream music industry. Women's Music was established as a revolutionary genre to tell the stories of the power, the courage, and the reality of women's lives.

Holly Near established **Redwood Records** in 1973 and **Olivia Records** was found in 1976 by a lesbian-feminist collective with recording artists Cris Williamson, Meg Christian, and Margie Adam.

In 1990, a generation later, Ani Di Franco established **Righteous Babe Records** to be able to record her own vision in her own way. Also in the 1990's and associated with third-wave feminism, **Riot grrrl** bands emerged as an underground feminist punk rock movement often addressing issues such as rape, domestic abuse, sexuality, racism and patriarchy.

Holly Near

(1949 – Present)
Singer, Songwriter
and Activist

"I am open and I am willing For to be hopeless would seem so strange

It dishonors those who go before us So lift me up to the light of change."

Holly Near has inspired generations with music that chronicles progressive activism of the late 20th and early 21st centuries. During the war against Indochina, Near began to write songs based on historic and current events that were challenging progressives in the United States. She wrote about the killings at Kent and Jackson State, the struggles of The United Farm Workers and the frightening consequences of nuclear war. Her work with women in the military as well as women in countries occupied by the US military led Near to rethink the



role of women in the world and the policy that challenges women in a very particular way. Near began to write songs specifically about women's lives both in a global and personal context.

One of the many founders of what became known as "women's music," Near was one of the first women to create an independent record company. In 1973 Redwood Records was formed and for nearly 20 years produced and promoted

music rooted in the ideas of peace and feminism. An extraordinary coalition builder in what she calls the "heady days" of 70s activism, Near helped link the work of activists in the field of ecology, international feminism, global peace initiatives and LGBTQ awareness. Near has generously shared her talent to raise millions of dollars for progressive organizations. Her songs "Singing For Our Lives", "It Could Have Been Me", "I Ain't Afraid", The Great Peace March and "I Am Willing" have become anthems for activist communities throughout the world.

Near's unusual contribution historically placed in the post sixties era of feminist activism crystallized her iconic status. Her genuine performance style, powerful voice and inspirational lyrics identify her as a unique contributor to women's history as well as a remarkable vocalist and entertainer.

The Berkshire Conference on the History of Women

The Berkshire Conference on the History of Women evolved as the main event of the Berkshire Conference of Women Historians which started in 1930 to address the isolation felt by women in the profession. The conference began in the early 1970s and grew out of the flourishing interest in women's studies across the country. The first conference took place at Douglass College, Rutgers University, in 1973. Expecting only 100 or so participants, the Douglass Conference drew instead three times that number, prompting calls for another.

The Berkshire Conference on the History of Women (often referred to as the Big Berks or just Berks) is now held every three years and has become the largest women's history event in the world. Incorporated as a non-profit organization, the organization promotes the interest of women historians, their allies and friends and the scholarship and activities of women in the historical profession by fostering friendship, and the exchange of ideas, among a global network of feminist historians. Today, the organization has taken a leading role in promoting the history of women, gender and sexuality. Vicki Ruiz is the past president of the Berkshire Conference of Women Historians.

Vicki L. Ruiz

(1955 – Present) **Educator and Pioneer in Latina History**

"For me, history remains a grand adventure, one which began at the kitchen table listening of the stories of my mother and grandmother and then took flight aboard the local bookmobile."

Vicki Ruiz was the first in her family to receive any advanced degree, after which she earned a Ph.D in History at Stanford in June 1982. Two months later she showed up for her first teaching position with a baby on her hip and another on the way. Over the course of three decades, Ruiz has been a major force in shaping the field of Chicana history.

In 2012, when she became the first Latina historian inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, her commendation



recognized ... "Her pioneering scholarship and leadership... "skillfully blending insights from the history of women, of workers, and from the arena of ethnic studies." Ruiz has inspired generations of students and scholars to integrate this large and complex ethnic group into the broad tapestry of American history.

Over the course of three decades, Dr. Ruiz has published over fifty essays and one dozen books

including Cannery Women, Cannery Lives and From Out of the Shadows: Mexican Women in Twentieth Century America. Her edited or co-edited collections include *Unequal Sisters: An* Inclusive Reader in U.S. Women's History and the three-volume, Latinas in the United States: A Historical Encyclopedia. Dedicated to the people whose lives she is writing back into history, Ruiz, writes .. "As a historian, I have had the privilege of interviewing people whose quiet courage made a difference in their lives and in their communities."

A committed educator, Dr. Ruiz contributed to numerous public history projects, including documentaries, museum exhibits, oral history programs, high school workshops, and teacher seminars. She is currently President of the American Historical Association.








-Weaving Women's Stories by 2015 Honorees-

In celebration of our 35th anniversary, we have chosen to honor nine women who have contributed in very special ways to our work of "writing women back into history." Years before the National Women's History Project was founded, Eleanor Flexner's watershed book, Century of Struggle, on the American women's rights movement, introduced us to dozens of courageous women leaders and reminded us of countless, nearly forgotten actions by women. In the 70s, Lynn Sherr's Women's Appointment Calendar was a day-by-day, fun-filled recollection of women's historic events, and Holly Near's music encouraged and challenged us to believe in the extraordinary possibilities of collective action. In 1980, when we began the NWHP, we were very privileged to have Gerda Lerner as Chair of our Advisory Committee and she was soon joined by multicultural scholars Darlene Clark Hine, Vicki L Ruiz, and Judy Yung. Their guidance was essential as we worked to develop materials that reflected the diverse cultural history of all American women. Expanding our network, we discovered Polly Weltz Kaufman and her amazing work with students in developing the Boston Women's Heritage Trail. The writings of Delilah Beasley's and Glaydis Tantaquidgeon expanded our knowledge by focusing on the unrecognized women who are so essential to our historic tapestry. Together, these 2015 Honorees have written, co-authored, or edited more than 60 books and Holly Near has produced 30 CDs. Their diverse creations reveal the depth and breadth of the multicultural female experience. They have woven women's stories into the fabric of our history.

Preparing for the Long Haul

The year 1915 marked a whole new level of activism for the suffrage movement in the U.S. Suffragist used new strategies like casting the Women's Liberty Bell, creating the torch of Freedom, and launching a flotilla of woman suffrage boats in New York Harbor. Still, male voters in all four prominent eastern states (Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania) rejected the idea of women having the right to vote. It is inspiring to note however, that just two years later, in 1917, New Yorkers launched yet another battle that succeeded. It was a victory that gave momentum to the national amendment just three years later.






